Jeff Voeller - Boundary Update:

The committee met last Tuesday, February 11th, to prepare a Proposal 2 Map, to be presented at the Community Open House next Tuesday, February 18th.

They were presented two models "Yellow-Edited" and "Purple Edited" based on feedback from the previous week. With a modification to the "Yellow- Edited" they voted (by a narrow margin) to bring the attached Committee Proposal 2 for Elementary Schools to the community open house.

They are still working on options for Middle and High School boundaries and selecting preference through a survey.

Trina Caudle - Trail Creek Changes And Updates:

With the increase in enrollment at the Middle School level, providing a high quality and safe experience for 6th grade students at Trail Creek has been increasingly difficult. Ensuring adequate medical services continues to be another issue with the increase in student numbers and needs for assistance with acute conditions and prescriptions. Staff members have shared these same concerns along with the amount of time they are away from their families. (Many staff members have young families.)

Middle school principals have been working with Lutherhaven to discuss options and address supervision and programing concerns. Both parties have agreed to the following:

- Reducing the experience from 2 overnight stays to 1 overnight stay
- Reducing the maximum number of students attending at one time to 75 students
- Increasing supervision to 1 chaperone per 9 students, per gender
- Sending 3 teachers per group (1:25 student to teacher ratio)
- Changing the cost to \$55 per student and \$20 per chaperone (teachers and staff are free)

Moving to smaller groups and reducing to 1 overnight stay will lessen the impact on instructional time at school, provide a more personal and positive community building experience at Lutherhaven, and be more inviting for those who do not attend due to the cost or fear of an extended overnight stay away from home.

Under this model Woodland would send 4 different groups. Lakes would send 3 different groups. And, Canfield would send 3 or 4 depending on enrollment numbers. Trail Creek for the fall of 2020 has been tentatively scheduled as follows:

- Canfield Groups September 21st 25th
- Lakes Groups September 28th October 2nd
- Woodland Groups October 5th 9th

Program changes also reduce the cost to the District while allowing the District to better compensate staff who attend Trail Creek. Attached is the cost summary for fall 2019 as prepared by **Katie Ebner**, Director of Finance. Attached is also an estimated budget for fall 2020 for comparison as prepared by **Kelly Ostrom**, Director of Human Resources.

Kate Keinert - QPR Initiative Update:

Nichole Piekarski has been scheduling QPR trainings with our elementary schools, as we continue our effort to ensure all staff have receive the valuable training. I have delivered the QPR training to several adult audiences (both staff and community) since I became a trainer last year, but I'm writing to share my two most recent opportunities to provide QPR training.

A few weeks ago, I was invited to provide QPR training to Canfield Middle School's Sources of Strength students. Nearly 90 students convened in the library to learn about Question, Persuade, Refer (I'll admit, I was a tad intimidated by the size and energy of this group!). They were a polite and engaged audience. **Saprina Schueller** introduced the topic by sharing her powerful, touching testimony of her belief that through open communication and destignatization, we can make great strides in preventing suicide.

Yesterday, I provided QPR training to the Sources of Strength and Mentor students at Lake City. These students were trusting, attentive, full of questions and insights, and so committed to taking care of their classmates. It filled my bucket just to be with them, but it also warmed my heart to hear how much they care about their fellow students. Afterwords, I was approached by a number of students who wanted to share concerns or stories. One student shared her desire to persue a career in counseling and we talked about courses Lake City offers to help her explore this field.

Kate Orozco - Elementary Updates:

Greetings, Trustees, from Denver Colorado. By the time you read this, we will have returned from four days of learning. I wrote to **Dr. Cook** and several colleagues the other day that this particular Institute has a special "feel," and I'm not sure why. We are here with two good-sized high school groups (CHS and LCHS) and 4 elementary teams. There are just over 40 of us here.

Some of you are aware that each day after the sessions, the Coeur d'Alene people gather together to discuss our learning, talk about what it means for us and for our students when we return, and also discuss how we, as a District, can weave together our beliefs and efforts so that our students will someday experience a seamless thread of purposeful, rigorous, deeply thoughtful learning from early childhood through graduation. We have a long way to go, but as I listened to elementary and high school teachers in small groups, mixed together, sharing their thoughts and inspiration, I came back again to my belief that our goal is attainable.

You may be curious to "peek into" what our folks are processing at the end of each TSI day. I captured notes from those end-of-day debriefs, and they are here. At the bottom of the document I linked are photos of our people "knee deep" in the learning.

Scott Maben - Getting Our Teacher Pages Back In Shape:

We have far too many teacher pages that are out of date or completely blank. We aim to fix that over the next four to six weeks, starting with a little incentive (a drawing for movie tickets) to encourage teachers to log in and update or build their pages. Recognizing that some teachers may never have been shown how to do this, we worked with **Kim Shandy** in Technology to make new tutorials and technology guides, and we are asking school-based web editors to pitch in and help teachers with this task. At the minimum we'd like each teacher page to include the name and photo of the teacher, what they teach, a short bio (college degrees, teaching philosophy, interests and hobbies, family), and contact info. Even better if they add class schedules and links to learning resources, such as this great page by <u>Tara Nelson</u> at Canfield. Our goal is to have current, informative teacher pages at all schools by spring break.
