Trina Caudle - Collaborative And Problem Solving Sessions (CAPSS) AND Interest Based Bargaining (IBB) Update:

The Administrative and CEA CAPSS Teams held their monthly meeting on Thursday, February 27th. **Trina Caudle** and **Kelly Ostrom** facilitated the meeting.

- **Jeff Voeller** updated the teams on the Boundary Change process, sharing the committee's work and explaining the next steps as recommendations go to the Board of Trustees.
- The teams also discussed the changes to Trail Creek as highlighted in last week's Board Memo. Feedback from all schools was positive in regard to the changes.
- The teams continued the discussion and options around Employee Protection and ensuring an environment of felt safety for students and staff at schools. Potential options were categorized into Education for Staff, Reporting Process, and Data Collection. **Andi West** presented on her work thus far towards Social Emotional Learning and TBRI professional development.

The CAPSS teams will have two more meetings prior to beginning the Interest Based Bargaining (IBB) negotiations process and would like the representative(s) from the Board of Trustees to join the teams for the April 23rd meeting. At the April meeting the teams will update the Board representative(s) on work done thus far, prior to beginning the formal IBB process.

Kate Orozco - Fundraising:

An elementary and secondary committee met with **Dr. Cook, Katie Ebner, Trina Caudle**, and **Kate Orozco** to discuss current fundraising practices in our schools in light of Board policy and District guidelines. Upon close examination, the committee concluded that many/most current school fundraising practices do not meet the requirements described in board policy. In order to bring those practices in line with policy, the committee concluded that fundraising practices would have to meet these requirements:

- 1. All parent/student communication of the fundraiser must include an analysis of where the funds raised will be invested. For example, 50% to PTO, 30% Prizes, 10% Administration Fees, and 10% Credit Card fees
- 2. All fundraising communication to families and students must include a disclaimer that families have the option to donate directly to the school PTO, rather than donating to the fundraising company if families would prefer to donate in this way.
- 3. If the fundraiser includes incentives for students or families to assist in the fundraiser, all students must be allowed to participate in the incentives--regardless of their participation in the fundraiser efforts. For example, if the school sets a criteria and raises a certain amount toward the fundraiser, the entire school may participate in the celebration.

4. The same guideline extends to student prizes. No prizes are awarded to individual students for selling certain amounts of items. Prizes must be given school wide. For example, if a school determines a sales goal for the building, or intermittent sales goals throughout the course of the fundraising event, the practices the entire school is invited to participate in the celebration.

Kate Orozco - Elementary Updates:

Magnet Schools:

We continue to live in the land of in-between a little bit, trying to support Sorensen and Ramsey in their spring enrollment procedures. Although we are slowing down the efforts to review and revise magnet policies, we recognize that we still need to move forward with "normal" magnet enrollment procedures--especially because Ramsey's enrollment will be an important factor in how we make our staffing decisions on March 12th. In the meantime, Sorensen and Ramsey will send out and receive applications, and follow the windows/procedures as in the past--knowing that the overlay decisions will impact their application selection process.

Kindergarten Full Day Pilot Program - Next Year:

Because we will be addressing a number of changes in boundaries, enrollment, and staffing as we prepare for the 2020-21 School year, and because classroom space will continue to be an uncertainty in several of our elementary schools, the Cabinet and Elementary Administrative teams have has concluded that it makes sense and will create some coherence and stability to continue the current Full Day Kindergarten Pilot as it now exists for the 20-21 School Year. This translates to the following kindergarten offerings:

- Full Day Tuition FREE kindergarten will be offered at Borah, Bryan, Fernan, NExA, and Winton.
- 1 Full Day Tuition-based classroom will be offered at Atlas, Dalton, Meadows, Ramsey, Skyway, and Sorensen.

IN ADDITION

We are suggesting that principals have the flexibility to increase the number of scholarshipped seats in each of the Full Day Tuition-Based classrooms from 5 to 8 *only if needed*--specifically in order to meet the academic, developmental, and social emotional needs of students if necessary.

During the 2020-21 School Year we will study the possibility of expanding the full day kindergarten program for the 2021-22 School Year. There is a clear understanding that Free Full Day Kindergarten is advantageous and should be offered at every school for all families. The two challenges to this goal include funding and space at a number of our schools.

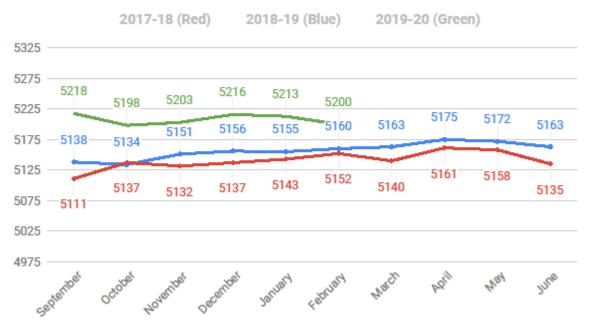

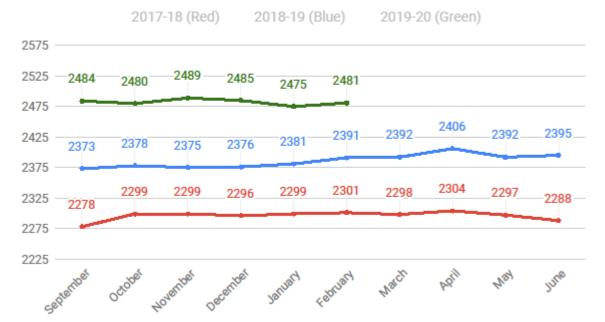

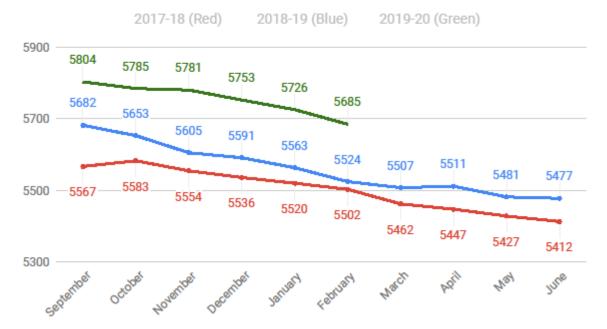
MIDDLE SCHOOL ENROLLMENT
